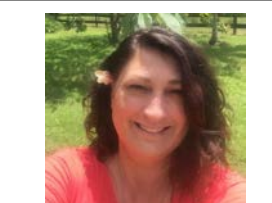

YEAR 10 INTO 11 SUBJECT SELECTIONS

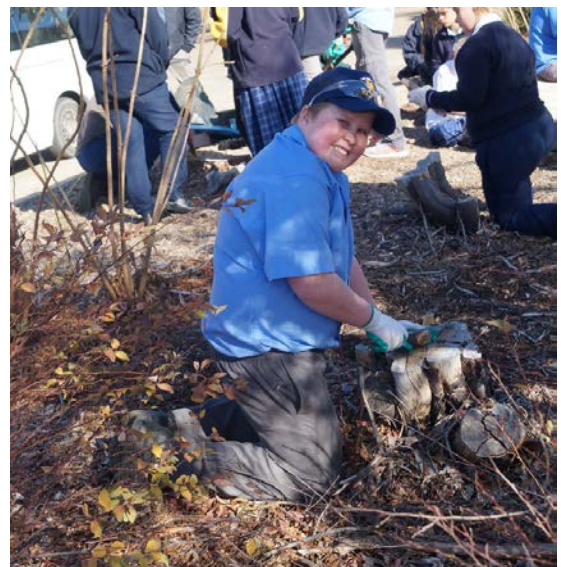

NATIONAL ART SCHOOL EXPERIENCE!

Last term **Maddie Burgess, Tahleia** and **Angel Mascord** were successful in obtaining full scholarships to the National Art School in Sydney in order to complete the Intensive HSC Studio Practice Course. The first week was in the July holidays. All three girls had an amazing time in the city, viewing art at the galleries by night and tutored by day at the National Art School in the specialist areas of their choice.

In the words of Tahleia Mascord,

"...we made our way to the Sydney National Art School during the 2nd week of the school holidays and learnt so much from our experience. The course I picked was Life Drawing, which involves the act of drawing posed nude models for a certain amount of time. At first, I was very embarrassed by the concept of drawing nude people; however, I overcame this embarrassment and really enjoyed my four days there. I have learnt so much about the human body, perspective, measurement and the flow of pencil lines. I cannot wait to study at the National Art School again in the October holidays."

Every year students are able to apply for Scholarships for the HSC Intensive Practice Course, which does give the students an extra qualification on their Higher School Certificate. We are overjoyed to have had three Visual Arts students accepted this year, which is a real credit to the students' determination and commitment in the Arts!

YEAR 11 MATHEMATICS

Thinking Outside the Box

As part of the new Year 11 Standard Mathematics course, students were given a problem to create a box, and use a range of shapes to fill the box. Their challenge involved whether they chose to accept the more complicated base of a circle, therefore creating a cylindrical box, a triangular base, creating a triangular prism or a cube or rectangular prism. The area of the base was restricted to 200 cm^2 and the volume between $2500\text{--}3000 \text{ cm}^3$. The range of responses was impressive, with many students creating their own solutions.

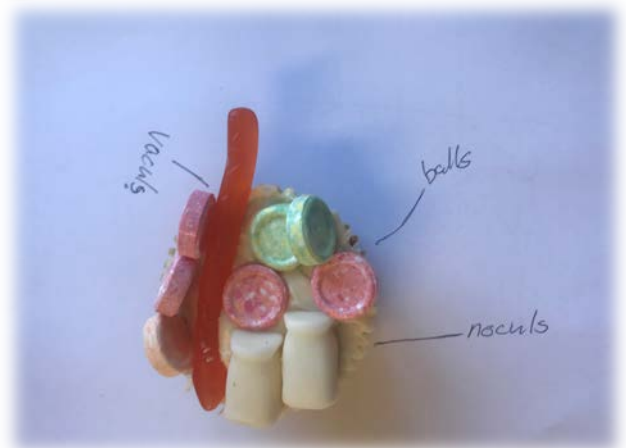
YEAR 7 SCIENCE

This term in Year 7 we studied cells.

Towards the end of the term the students made cell cakes to show their knowledge of the parts of an animal cell and plant cell (they then got to eat their efforts as a reward:)).

The task was to use the provided cakes and lollies to create a model of a cell. The students then had to label the organelles. This was all completed by recalling their knowledge rather than looking at diagrams or information. This activity was designed for revision and as a fun activity to end the term.

YEAR 10 COMMERCE/LEGAL EXCURSION TO SYDNEY

A group of Year 10 Commerce students recently travelled to Sydney to develop a better understanding of how the legal system works in NSW. Mrs Chisholm's thorough planning and ability to organise 'one off 'special experiences for the students meant that the trip was highly educational and successful for all who participated.

The excursion commenced at NSW Parliament House, where the students were privileged enough to enter the floors of both Houses of Parliament, the Legislative Assembly and the Legislative Council. Here they were educated on the protocols and processes of Parliament before having the opportunity to role play the passing of a Bill, using all of the regalia employed by our current Premier, Ministers of Parliament and opposition members.

The Bill proposed the lifting of the legal drinking age from 18 to 21. There was a considerably spirited (no pun intended) debate before the Bill was defeated in the Upper House. Alyssa Watts performance as Sargent at Arms (responsible for ejecting unruly MP's) in the Legislative Assembly was a particularly memorable part of the role play, which took nearly an hour and a half to work our way through.

Students left Parliament House that afternoon with a thorough working knowledge of how laws are made. They were also much more aware of their own capacity to influence the law making process and to become active citizens, a theme that was repeated constantly throughout the excursion.

After Parliament House, students walked to Circular Quay to visit the Sydney Justice and Police Museum, the site of Australia's oldest Police Station and Courtroom. Students took in exhibits of weapons used in murders, and followed the development of forensic investigation in Australia examining genuine evidence from the 1938 'Pyjama Girl' case as they did so.

Before leaving, students role played a court proceeding in the oldest Court room in Australia. The case was a sentencing hearing, calling character witnesses for the defendant, Mercades Oste. The highlight of the proceeding was Amy Wilson's Oscar worthy performance as the jilted girlfriend of the defendant. Her testimony was scathing and successful in leaving the Magistrate no option but to invoke the maximum custodial sentence. Mercades incessant giggling throughout proceedings, also did little to convince the Magistrate of her remorse.

Our next stop was an 'Escape Room' experience where the students were divided into two teams, each looking to solve the same problem in the fastest possible time. Each team was locked into a room, and had to use their wits, numerous clues and team work in order to unlock a series of doors and eventually solve Australia's greatest mystery, the disappearance of Harold Holt. Despite the anxiety and frustration of the situation, both groups managed to rescue Harold within the one hour time limit and had a great time doing so.

The second day of the excursion began with a tour of the Downing Centre, Sydney's centre for Magistrates and District Courts. Here, we were very fortunate to be invited to speak with the Head of the NSW Mental Health Tribunal, Richard Cogswell SC. Judge Cogswell was incredibly generous with his time speaking for over an hour with the students, discussing his own experiences as a student of law overseas, his appointments as State Prosecutor and some of his more memorable experiences as a Judge for over thirty years. Judge Cogswell provided sage advice as he emphasized the importance of seizing opportunities as they arise when pursuing a career in Law.

Although Judge Cogswell took a particular shine to Sharna Campbell; when he discovered that they shared a passion for yoghurt, yoga and meditation, he made a strong impression on all students, earning the unanimous accolade: 'He was really cool'...

Students spent the remainder of the afternoon, touring the various courts of the Downing Centre, witnessing arraignments, trials and sentencing procedures. By the time they departed they had become very practiced in Court procedure and protocol.

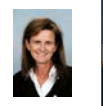

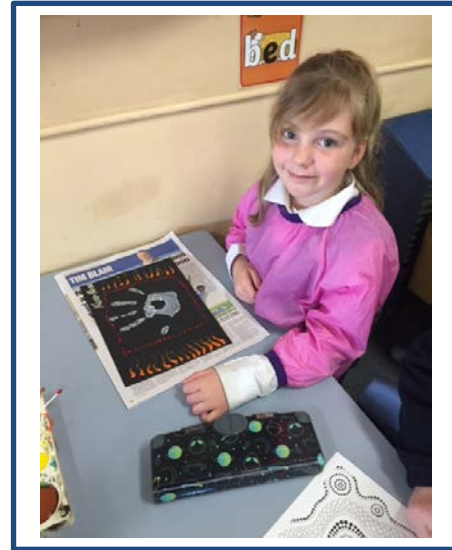
PRIMARY VISIT KINROSS

Police Liaison Visit.

We are fortunate enough to have a very proactive and approachable Police Liaison Officer, Senior Constable Jane Heffernan, attached to Molong Central School. Jane has spoken to our students on numerous occasions on varying subjects. I have asked her to come and speak to our Year 10, 11 and 12 students on a topic that is of most importance – the issue of safe partying and road safety.

A lot of our students will be getting their L plates in the months ahead and it is imperative that they are educated on not only the laws surrounding driving but also keeping themselves and others safe on the road.

The issue of safe partying is one that should be discussed both at home and school with our students. Senior Constable Heffernan will be discussing not only the law that surrounds drugs and alcohol but also strategies to keep students safe at parties and the like. I ask that each parent/carer discusses with their children what has been covered at these sessions.

Social Media

Once again we will have Safe on Social Media visiting Molong Central School discussing staying safe online. This will be in the shape of information sessions for students, staff and the community. I encourage anyone that wants to know more about social media and how they can help to protect their children online to attend. More information will be sent home shortly.

The Office of the e-Safety Commissioner has a wealth of knowledge on everything to do with social media. There is a dedicated page to games, apps and social networking which includes links to over 70 different games, apps and network sites to give more specific information on each.

You are able to learn about the latest apps, how to protect your information and where to get more safety guidance. All information provided is factual and it is up to each individual to decide whether an app, game or social networking site is appropriate for themselves and their family.

Any app or game that allows user to interact with others including people they may not know, presents a potential risk of unwanted contact.

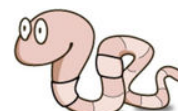

WHERE ARE THEY NOW – KATHERINE LANCE (HERBERT)



Katherine Lance (Kath Herbert) Class of 1987.

After graduating MCS I went to Charles Sturt University in Bathurst and studied Early Childhood, My first teaching job was Year 2 at MCS in 1992!! To this day it was the happiest year of my professional life 😊

I taught K-2 at a few small schools in the Central West before moving to Dubbo in 1996 where I began working in the long day care and preschool sector.

From 1997-2017 I worked for TAFENSW delivering training in Certificate 111 and Diploma Early Childhood Education and Care across the west and far west. I had the opportunity to travel to China in 2015 to deliver 5 days training to an early childhood service that catered for 800 children.

In 2017 I accepted the position of Director at Banyan Park Play Centre on Norfolk Island. I spent 12 months working with the quirky, free spirited children of the Island and falling in love with the amazing beauty that is around every corner of this spectacular speck in the middle of the Pacific Ocean. The people of the island have been a mixture of suspicious and welcoming and they most definitely don't like change! There is, however, that small community spirit that Molong also possesses and I think that's why I chose to stay on when my time at Banyan finished.

Cost of living on the Island is expensive and when you watch how everything arrives on the island you understand why. <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=8-C0WftEj0I>

There is no harbor, so everything is ferried from a larger ship about 5kms offshore, over the reef to the pier on 'lighters' (locally built shallow bottomed boats) where it is then craned onto the pier to be collected. Most fruit and vegetables are locally grown and organic and although they look unattractive are very tasty. The cows on the island are very precious and roam the island freely. They are not at all bothered by cars and there are large penalties if you hit one with your car.

Security is laid back and lax- we leave our keys in our cars and in the 3 places I've lived I've not once been given a house key. Crime rates are low and mainly only petty issues.

I am currently operating Family Daycare from my home for 5 children and am enjoying it greatly!

I have 3 sons, Jono, 30, who is a Chiropractor in Sydney, Harrison, 24, a TV News Journalist with Prime7 in Orange and Nick, 19, who is having a gap year before going to ANU to study a Bachelor of International and Global studies.

Life has had many challenges but it has had many happy times too and Year 11 and 12 were 2 of the happiest years of my life. I remain close friends with many of my classmates and we still get together at least once a year.

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability

Notification for Parents and Carers

All Government and non-Government schools across Australia are required to participate annually in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD).

All Australian schools will collect data on their students who are receiving adjustments to meet additional learning and support needs in accordance with their obligations under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and *Disability Standards for Education 2005*. This data will be provided to the Australian Government to assist in the development of a consistent, national picture of the education needs of students with disability.

The data provided to the Australian Government by the NSW Department of Education is provided in such a way that it cannot be used to identify any individual student or school.

Privacy Protection

The NSW Department of Education follows the requirements of the *Privacy and Personal Information Protection Act 1998* and the *Health Records and Information Privacy Act 2002*. Schools will collect, record, store and use data about individual students in line with these requirements. Data security and protection is a priority and students' personal details will be kept confidential.

Under Clause 52 of the Commonwealth *Australian Education Regulation 2013*, data collected by the NSW Department of Education for the NCCD must be provided to the Australian Government Department of Education and Training. This includes the number of students at each level of education, the number in each category of disability and the number at each level of adjustment. The information is provided to the Commonwealth as a series of number sets that cannot be used to identify any individual student or school.

The Australian Government Department of Education and Training follows the requirements of the Commonwealth *Privacy Act 1988* when handling any data provided by NSW Department of Education in connection with the national data collection. A public information notice has been developed to by the Australian Government to provide students, parents and carers with important privacy information in relation to the data collection.
