STYMIE LAUNCHED AT MOLONG CENTRAL SCHOOL

Stymie allows bystanders to send an anonymous message, which will be received by a member of the executive. The notification interface allows bystanders to upload evidence like screen shots of Facebook discussions, Snapchats, text messages or instant message conversations and an outline of the incident(s). The messages are automatically forwarded to a member of the executive. The first conversation we have will be with the student who is experiencing harm and then steps are taken to build some support around the identified young person should that be required.



Molong Central School is committed to harnessing the power of bystanders to ensure students feel safe and supported at school and in the online environment. Stymie compliments Molong Central School's existing student behaviour policy. We hope to create a community of proactive students who are willing to stand up for the rights of other students. In the first week of implementation we had numerous reports which have been acted on, where appropriate, by our executive team. It has been heartening to see how much our students care for each other and I believe this is a tool they have been waiting for to find their voice. Of course all the regular lines of communication remain like making a face to face report but this is another way to engage with our young people.

MOLONG CENTRAL SCHOOL SIGNS THE MOLONG ABORIGINAL EDUCATION CONSULTATIVE GROUP PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT (AECG)

Last week Molong Central School hosted an assembly to incorporate Reconciliation Week and the signing of the AECG Partnership Agreement.

The Partnership Agreement is a statement of intent of how the NSW AECG and the Department of Education and Training are planning on working together. The strength of the NSW AECG is its community base through its network of local and regional AECGs. This allows Aboriginal people to have a voice in self-determining their educational future which will impact on the future prosperity of Aboriginal communities.





Students were engaged in the presentations and we were fortunate to have Aunty Joyce Williams in attendance to conduct the Welcome to Country. Our Aboriginal and Torres Strait population has grown from 4% to 14% in 4 years and the signing of the partnership agreement strengthens the relationship between the Molong Aboriginal Educational Consultative Group and Molong Central School. The Molong AECG meet twice per term and parents and care givers of Aboriginal and Torres Strait students are encouraged to attend.

A BIG BUSINESS STARTS SMALL

At Molong Central School we have recognised that enterprise skills are crucial for preparing students for the future of work and in response, to the feedback from last year participants we are involved again in 2019.

\$20 Boss is a nationwide immersive entrepreneurship program, which focuses on students learning the skills of critical thinking, team work, project planning and financial literary. Year 11 Business Studies students are provided with \$20 of start-up capital to help them create, launch and operate their enterprise over the course of a school term. Businesses that make a profit are required to repay the original \$20 of start-up capital.

Students will learn key elements of entrepreneurship and will be taught how to make money and create social good by donating 50% of their profits to a charity or social cause. Some of the charities supported this year include the Red Cross, Buy a Bale and the Salvation Army.

The trading period for our student businesses are from Week 9 and 10 of Term 2 and through the holidays. The business range from selling homemade socks, packaged manure, computer gaming lounge and food stalls. If these student businesses are selling something you want then please support their endeavours.

ASX GAME WINNERS 2019

Congratulations to our student and teacher winners of the 2019 School Sharemarket Game.

Students studying Business Studies and a third of secondary teachers participated. Players received a virtual \$50,000 to invest over a 10 week period, in 220 companies listed on the ASX. This game is played nationally with over 15,000 players. The prices students buy and sell at are the same prices as they would get in the live market so this is as close to real life share trading as you can get. The prize along with bragging rights this year were some very gaudy gold dollar glasses.
